**Course Description:**

This course was designed to prepare students in the Kahlert School of Computing for their time at the University of Utah. We will provide you with information about resources on campus, opportunities to interact with peer mentors, faculty, and advisors, and time to meet other students. Our goal is to help you be successful in your undergraduate degree and be able to access any help you may need.

**Course Objectives:**

- Demonstrate knowledge of various campus resources and how to use them
- Increase understanding of academic skills including communication, collaboration, and problem solving
- Initiate and maintain interpersonal relationships with peers, faculty, and advisors
- Increase understanding of majors in KSOC and possible pathways after graduation

**Grading:**

This course will be for Credit/No Credit. **You will need to elect C/NC for this class by September 1.** You will be graded on attendance, participation, and a couple of assignments outside of class time. Attendance is required for this class, and it is the majority of what your grade will consist of. There are 14 classes, and you are expected to attend at least 12. You will be able to make up two absences if needed.
