Course Description:

A fiction writing workshop for English majors and creative writing minors.

Course Outcomes and Objectives:

- Facilitate in building and retaining a vocabulary to discuss literature and writing
- Develop skills in “reading like a writer” through engagement with contemporary fiction
- Compose, workshop, and revise short stories that are as close to being “completed” (or publishable) as possible
- Begin to identify and articulate a practice as creators

Course Requirements:

15% | Lists of noticings

20% | Narrative exercises (3)

7.5% | One narrative for workshop (2,000-5,000-ish words)

7.5% | On narrative for one-on-one meeting (2,000-5,000-ish words)

20% | Workshop responses to peers’ stories (several)

10% | Final Project (with artist’s articulation)

20% | Active participation (including attendance)
